Poland confirmed its **first Covid-19 death** on 12 March 2020, a 56-year old female patient from Poznań, a central Polish city. Health Minister Łukasz Szumowski said that the fatality had serious health problems before the infection. Public and private schools at all levels, from kindergarten to university, cinemas, theaters and museums were declared closed for 2 weeks starting on 12 March 2020 to curtail the spread of the virus. The total number of confirmed cases rose to 51 patients, less one death.

In **Estonia**, eleven new cases brought the number of confirmed coronavirus infections to 27 as of late evening of 12 March 2020. The Estonian Health Board announced that a case of **local transmission** has been identified. Estonia raised the risk level and adopted a new strategy. The focus now is to limit the spread of the disease.

In **Latvia**, six new cases have been confirmed, bringing the total to 16. Prime Minister Krišjānis Kariņš announced that a **state of emergency** was declared so that educational institutions can be closed for four weeks starting today, 13 March 2020, and large public gatherings of more than 200 people will be banned.

Lithuania suspended activity of all educational, cultural, sports and leisure establishments for two weeks until 27 March 2020, and declared a **travel ban** to high-risk countries.
